# Debra's Deliberations

My December Deliberations are always an invitation to reflect on the year that is ending. This year the theme of wonder offers a frame for me to do so. I reflect with wonder on all that has been shared and done this past year, the deepening of relationships amongst us, the new faces and members and friends who find here a community of support and challenge, the incredible

dedication of the many volunteers who make the Unitarian Church of Calgary the place it is.

The opening words for this month's Reflections lift up the fact that as Unitarians we place wonder front and center. The first of our six UU sources of wisdom, which accompany our seven principles, is "Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life." Notice the bigness of this. We are not being called to notice those few moments when we get lucky or when things go our way. The focus is on the forces upholding everything! We are always fortunate; that's the radical claim. That's the transcendent awareness that truly renews the spirit. It's all a wonder! Every last little part of this thing we call life! Feeling that is the goal. Albert Einstein expresses this best: "There are only two ways to live your life. One is as though nothing is a miracle. The other is as though everything is a miracle."

Wonder is also one of those English words that has multiple meanings, as a noun it offers a way to describes a sense of amazement or perhaps marvel or an object that elicits such a response. It can also be a verb that invites curious speculation. As I prepare for my first sabbatical, I find myself wondering about what insights and understanding will arise during this time and space away from each other. I know some of my focus will be reflecting on my six years with the congregation, our achievements and the work we have yet to accomplish. Most of my reflection will be on what might we do together going forward. I wonder what personal changes I need to make to be more effective, to keep the work we do together a growing, deepening and inspirational relationship for all of us.

The sabbatical of a minister also offers the congregation a chance for discernment and reflection about its ministry. I know you will welcome our sabbatical replacement minister, Rev Carly Gaylor, and find her a wonder and a delight!

May this season of wonder and joy bring the gift of connection and love to the lives of all of us, may we reach out to those we care most about and those who need our caring. May we remember always the message of peace that is celebrated at this at this time in the year and the words of Howard Thurman:

The Work of Christmas

When the song of the angels is stilled,

When the star in the sky is gone,

When the kings and the princes are home,

When the shepherds are back with their flock,

The work of Christmas begins:

- to find the lost,
- to heal the broken
- to feed the hungry,
- to release the prisons,

to rebuild the nations,

- to bring peace among the people,
- to make music in the heart.

The first meeting was held in the Arcade Theatre on 8 Avenue S.E., and in following years, other now-defunct theatres were used. Since that time, Calgary Unitarians have met in a variety of unlikely locations, including the Palliser Hotel, a lumber office and the Labour Temple (a union hall). In 1968, we purchased our current home, which was formerly Cresent Heights United Church. Our church president at the time was the

recent recipient of the William Irvine Justice Award, Bill Wuttunee. With the loving care of many church members, our building has been maintained, renovated and modernized to meet our changing needs over the years.

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# Caring, Cooking, Connection

The Unitarian Church of Calgary in collaboration with Act III, a Carya Elder Friendly group in Winston Heights, was

awarded a *Stepping Stones Grant* to help with the Caring Cooking Connection program. We come together as a caring community in the church kitchen and prepare nutritious home-cooked meals. A sense of community is built among the cooks while they prepare, cook, dine, package, freeze and share with those community members who would benefit from these meals at no charge to them. On Thursday evening,



November 19, 27 members of the Siksika nation, the Unitarian church congregation, Act III and other community members gathered in the church kitchen to cook and share the food as well as a sense of community. The youth were paired with the older for a learning opportunity and afterwards in keeping with their culture they served their elders their meal; a wonderful tradition. The menu included meat and veggie chili, cream of mushroom soup, shepherd's pie, baked chicken and rice, mashed potatoes and baked fish and rice. After everyone ate, 38 meals were frozen for the wider community. The next CCC is planned for January 21, 2016, 4-7pm.

### Danielle's Reflections Thinking about Integrity this past month has been discerning, and thought



provoking. I spent a lot of time considering how integrity would play into my ministry as I get ready to move on to the next stages of my journey. I also spent a lot of time contemplating what Integrity meant when connected to a church community. How can a church aspire to acting and being integral? How can the Unitarian Church of Calgary act with integrity? On October 29th I hosted a round table with members of our Church, and people from the surrounding community – we gathered to discover what each organization was doing, where we could help one another and possibilities to collaborate on new ideas or projects. Although a lot of ideas were discussed and a lot of dreams for the community were shared – there were two ideas that received a lot of enthusiasm. After sharing my journey about volunteering with the Siksika Family Services Office and telling the group

the youth group that is still running, which I helped initiate 2 years ago, one of the Case Workers from the Siksika Office talked about struggles that they are still having with their foster children. Several people suggested that we try to create a stronger network of resources for the Office to reach out to, and perhaps we could create a tutoring program, or a mentoring program. Another person mentioned that we could advertise the Siksika events in the community newsletters. Everyone was really thrilled about the possibilities of working together to support Siksika children and youth. The other idea for collaboration that was presented began from the conversation about our involvement in the Caring Cooking Connections. Members of our Church partnered with Carya and Act III to write a grant for this project, and we received money that allows us to gather and cook meals every 6-8 weeks. We cook lots of food, and lots of varieties so that when we have finished our community meal we have tonnes of left overs. These left overs are handed out to the people coming to the church looking for help, or sent to people who are in hospital. The group around our table thought it would be a great idea to host a lunch program with alternating sites, between churches in the neighbourhood, community associations, and other available sites. This way people in the community would know that any day of the week they could go for lunch and meet their neighbours. Someone suggested that we use vegetables from our community garden, who would also be happy to donate vegetables during harvest time to the Caring Coking Connections. All of these ideas reflect to me a community trying to live with

integrity. To live fully into the idea of being a good neighbour, or to develop the community that one lives in – these are examples that I have seen of integrity this month. I am so looking forward to working on these projects. And can hardly await to see what Wonder will bring into my life.

# **Refugee Sponsorship Committee Update**

Members of the congregation have been meeting over the past few weeks to explore the possibility of sponsoring an Iraqi or Syrian refugee family, and it is now official! At its November 10 meeting, the Board made the decision that we would proceed with sponsorship, formally established the Refugee Sponsorship Committee, and approved the creation of a Refugee Sponsorship Fund. This paves the way to preparing an application to sponsor a refugee family.

Through Tom Mirhady and his friend from the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra, we have learned of a particular Iraqi family of five, now living in Turkey, of which the father is a cellist. We will work towards sponsoring this family; if for some reason we are unsuccessful, we will endeavor to sponsor another family.

The Committee now has about 30 members and is growing daily. We will be working through the Canadian Unitarian Council, who have already provided us with many resources. There are two major components to our work: sponsorship (i.e. fundraising, and making application for sponsorship), and settlement (once the family has arrived in Canada, providing volunteers to assist with the various aspects of making a life in Calgary).

We are now ready to start fundraising. Based on estimates from the CUC, our target is \$43,000 (although some of this can be met with in-kind donations). We will be accepting donations from people within as well as outside the church, and charitable receipts will be issued for donations. Also, we will be organizing a variety of fundraising events and activities. Here are some current projects:

Carolyn Preston has developed an exciting proposal for a fundraising dinner – A Night in Baghdad – which has been submitted to the Finance Committee for approval.

Jane Ebbern is going to be giving a 'gift of a new life" in lieu of a gift for a friend's upcoming wedding, by making a donation to the Refugee Sponsorship Fund. Others may wish to apply this idea in lieu of Christmas, wedding or birthday presents for those who already have everything they need.

Jane Perry is full of ideas for not one but two World Music concerts! Stay tuned for more info on these as they develop.

The Committee will be providing regular updates on our activities and progress through the Quest and E News. If you would like to be involved, you are most welcome to join the group. There are many opportunities for volunteers, no matter how much or how little time you have to offer.

In her words: Just as Rev. Debra is taking a time to reflect and learn and renew, I hope our time together will provide opportunities for reflection, renewal, experimentation, and most of all play! A sabbatical of four months is a wonderful chance to try new things, learn from what works and what doesn't, and enjoy the process. I look forward to working and learning and playing with you!

I am passionate about community-building, spiritual growth, and social justice. My experience as Executive Director of a faith-based non-profit and then as Assistant Minister for Outreach and Social Justice at the First Unitarian Church of Hamilton have helped me to understand these aspects of community from both non-profit and congregational perspectives. I also teach yoga and hope to lead some intergenerational yoga sessions while I'm with you.

I am happy that my partner, Curtis Murphy, will be joining me for this adventure.

*What will Rev. Carly be responsible for during the Sabbatical Period?* Rev. Carly has been hired to provide 30 hours per week of support so she will not be doing everything that Rev. Debra now does. Here are her major responsibilities while she is with us.

- She will lead a minimum of nine Sunday Services during the four months that she is with us.
- She will meet with the Church Services Committee, Music Director, etc. as required to plan for each service.
- Rev. Carly will attend Board Meetings and will meet with other committees such as Membership and Lay Chaplaincy.
- She will meet weekly with our staff.
- She will support the Caring Team in providing Pastoral Care as required.
- She will be available to provide rites of passage including possible memorial service leadership.
- Rev. Carly will mentor our Intern Minister, Danielle Webber.

What about conflicts or problems? As usual, the Committee on Shared Ministry is available to address conflicts that may arise between congregants or between a congregant and a staff member.

The Committee on Shared Ministry consists of: Marie Collins, Chair; Ann Kyle; Dean Kasner; Margaret McCrae; and Eric Leavitt.

What if I require some Pastoral Care? Pastoral care will continue to be provided by the Care and Concern Team who will work with Rev. Carly as needed. Rev. Carly is available for Rites of Passage as is our Chaplain, Carl Svoboda.

**How can I learn more or help out?** Ask Questions...anyone from the Sabbatical Support Team (Brandis Purcell, Charlene Hoeppner, or Eric Leavitt) will be happy to provide additional details about the Sabbatical and related activities. We have produced a brochure that will give more details about the Sabbatical; copies will be available at church. The Sabbatical Support Team will also meet regularly with Rev. Carly to provide support and feedback from the Congregation.

Calgary Co-op Liquor Store gift cards are a great way to support our church and purchase supplies for holiday entertaining. Both the regular store gift cards and the liquor store gift cards make great holiday presents for folks on your list! Co-op stores outside of Calgary honour them as well. You can also use them for yourself to purchase food for festive occasions or libations for entertaining. You must purchase a separate liquor card for use in the Co-op Liquor Store. The regular gift card cannot be used to purchase alcohol. The church receives receive 5% for orders with a total less than \$5000, 7% when we have gift card orders that total \$5000 - \$9999 and 10.5% for orders \$10,000 or more.

If you have not purchased a gift card before, here is how to do it:

- On the first Sunday of each month (December 6), bring cash or a cheque to church, payable to the Unitarian Church of Calgary. A table will be set up in Wickenden Hall and you may place your order there, either before or after the service. If you are not going to be at church on the first Sunday of the month and we don't already have post-dated cheques from you, please leave your cheque in Coop Card/Fruit Cake Cheques mail slot in the church office.
- The cards will be distributed on the second Sunday, (December 13). If you are unable to pick up your card on that day, you can collect it on the next Sunday. That's how easy it is!

**The Wonder of Darkness and Light**  $\sim$  For some of us, The Light as a symbol can represent the light of reason, by which we find our way in life. We honor reason in our tradition, and rebel against any faith system that demands we put aside our need for things to make sense. For others, The Light can represent the light of Spirit that ebbs and flows inside us as we feel sometimes drained and dusty; and other times energetic, enthusiastic, and supple. Some times in our lives are spirited times and others are dispirited times. As we contemplate the meanings of the dark times and the light times, the earth-based traditions would caution us against using The Dark as a symbol for all that is negative. We use "darkness" to speak as if it would be best to have no darkness at all, to have light all the time; that would be awful. There is a season for dark and a season for light; a reason for both.

Is it possible then that there is a time to feel energetic and time to feel drained in the rhythm of life? A time to let life and energy flow outward from you, and a time for it to flow inward? Maybe the ebb and flow of Spirit is a rhythm that is good to

feel. Maybe in our growing into wholeness there is a time to feel dusty and dry, "hard as iron" like the winter ground, and stony as winter water. Maybe instead of worrying and suffering over those feelings we could settle into them, knowing that there is a time for cold and a time for warmth, a time to be energetic and a time to rest, a time to grow and a time to stay where you are, a time for the light of reason and a time for other ways of knowing. Maybe we could walk in beauty and balance more easily if we could welcome the dark time, trusting that when it reaches its full strength, things will begin their tilt back in the other direction. Nothing stays the same in the flow of things. All things seek their balance and their rhythm. The wheel will always turn. The light will always be reborn.
