# **SWEET: Sunday Welcome Enhance and Engage Teams**

Do you find yourself wanting to help out on a Sunday morning, but aren't sure what to do? Are you tired of being asked to make coffee, be an usher or a greeter? Have you ever wondered if there was a different approach to enhance the hospitality experience and provide a way to develop and deepen relationships with each other?

If your answers to these questions are yes, then consider this description taken from the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Centre County web site:

"Hospitality Teams are a great way to meet people and learn about the Fellowship. Teams are in charge of Sunday morning hospitality. This includes greeting, ushering, providing food and beverages, cleaning-up and creating a visual display for the Sunday service. Team members also have social times to relax and get to know each other better. Each of the five teams provides hospitality for four Sundays, two times per year."

Various committees have watched this video and have come away excited and enthused about the idea. So excited that we are going to begin to adopt this process in the next church year! Only we are calling them SWEET. Each member or friend of the congregation will be placed into one of five geographic SWEETs taking on the responsibility for the Sunday morning experience for a month. Initially we will need five team coordinators and five communicators. We already have a number of people who have expressed interest in being involved and there is still space for more to be involved. It is this core of people that will run through how it's done for the month of September, and then the hope is in October SWEETs will be ready to begin. Watch for a display in Wickenden Hall on Sunday mornings that will outline how this process will work here at the Unitarian Church of Calgary.

We can see so many opportunities to welcome and deepen relationships within the congregation! We sang at the Opening Ceremony, provided two-thirds of the live entertainment at the Hootenanny, and made up half of the 56-voice choir at the Sunday worship service. Our church choir did yeoman's duty at the ACM—congratulations and appreciation to one and all!

She dealt with correspondence regarding the <u>Owl Program</u> and the <u>Sexuality Throughout the Lifespan</u> stream that she and Sean are offering at the ACM. It was then time to finalize the agenda for a 7 p.m. meeting, make a short private phone call, take a twenty minute walk, clean the chalice in the board room and have a 45-minute dinner break. At 6:45 she began setting up for the <u>Chalice Circle Facilitator</u> meeting where again, her input was thoughtful and valued.

I don't know what she did after 9 p.m., but I was beat and went home to bed.
